Kate Frazier expressed gratitude and appreciation for the Nisqually Tribe and shared that North Thurston Public Schools believes that it is the district's responsibility and honor as an academic institution, in partnership with the Nisqually Tribe to educate our students, staff and families about the true history of colonialism and the continued need to address colonialism today.

The land acknowledgement will encourage the community to reflect upon the land we are standing on and engage in conversations centered in honoring the land and decolonization. She acknowledged Mike Smith, Jerad Koepp, Alison McCartan and Josh Parker for their contributions to the project. She then introduced Jerad Koepp to read the proposed land acknowledgement.

Mel Hartley made a motion to approve the Land Acknowledgement. Chuck Namit seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

# B. Presentation of Nisqually Tribal Flags to North Thurston Public Schools

Kate Frazier introduced River Ridge Assistant Principal Mike Smith, who shared that each of the schools in the district would be flying Nisqually Tribal Flags and the flags would accompany a lesson for students. Mr. Smith then introduced Hanford McCloud from the Nisqually Tribe Council to speak about the partnership with North Thurston Public Schools. He expressed his gratitude to North Thurston Public Schools in being the first school district to partner on the land acknowledgement and shared he was honored to speak on behalf of the tribe and share culture, heritage and traditions.

Mel Hartley made a motion to fly the tribal flags at North Thurston Public School buildings. Chuck Namit seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.



# What is Land Acknowledgement?

Land acknowledgement is the practice of opening meetings and events with a statement recognizing the indigenous inhabitants of the land. North Thurston Public Schools resides on the traditional lands of the Nisqually people. (MAP)



"Acknowledgment is a simple, powerful way of showing respect and a step toward correcting the stories and practices that erase Indigenous people's history and culture and toward inviting and honoring the truth." (US DAC)

# NTPS Land Acknowledgement\*

We acknowledge that North Thurston Public Schools resides on the traditional lands of the Nisqually people. The Nisqually have lived on and cared for this land and these waterways since time immemorial. We make this acknowledgement to open a space of recognition, inclusion, and respect for our sovereign tribal partners and all indigenous students, families, and staff in our community.

# The Nisqually Flag

We are honored to be gifted Nisqually Tribe flags to fly at each of our 22 schools.

Flying this flag will serve as daily recognition of of their traditional lands, thriving government and culture, and increase openness and awareness of all indigenous peoples and to our duty to equitably support and educate their children.



# History of the Nisqually Tribe

"For 10,000 years the Nisqually Tribe lived in relative peace and prosperity in its aboriginal homeland of about 2 million acres near the present-day towns of Olympia, Tenino, and Dupont, and extending to Mount Rainier."

Their sovereignty, reservation, and rights are recognized in the 1854 Treaty of Medicine Creek. An example of a reserved right from the treaty includes, "The right of taking fish, at all usual and accustomed grounds and stations, is further secured to said Indians."








# Nisqually Tribe Today

Nisqually Tribal Flags

In honor of Native American Heritage Month, and in recognition of our ongoing partnership with the Nisqually Tribe, the North Thurston Public Schools will display the Nisqually Tribal Flag at every District site. As part of the flag display, every building will engage in a lesson developed in partnership with the Nisqually Tribe and North Thurston Public Schools staff. The purpose of this lesson is to educate our students, staff and families about the significance of the Nisqually Tribal flag and our ongoing commitment to partner with the Nisqually Tribe in educating our community about our history of colonization and the present day need to decolonize our education system.

The Nisqually Tribal Flag will be flown throughout the school year and only taken down during specific days when another flag is set to be flown such as the P.O.W flag. There are some building flag poles that are not tall enough to fly three flags when flags are required to be at half-mast. In this case, the Nisqually Tribal Flag will not be flown at certain buildings.

Essential Question: Why are we flying the Nisqually tribal flag across the school district?

Lesson Objective: Students will be able to explain why district schools are flying the Nisqually Tribal flag, and define a land acknowledgment.

Necessary Materials: projector & speakers, slides presentation, lesson guide

Click link to show a map of tribal lands in Washington State. Show optional videos (linked on slide).  Slide 3: Land Acknowledgment. Read the text of the land acknowledgment to students. Define terms as needed (optional - see below)  Discussion prompts by grade band:  All - What questions do you have about words or ideas in the statement?  Elementary - What does it mean to acknowledge something?  Middle - What does the statement 'sovereign tribal partners' imply about the relationship between North Thurston schools and the Nisqually tribe? respect? Are there other examples of this you can think of?  Slide 4: Flag. Read explanation of the flag. Invite discussion about what students see within the flag imagery. Let students know that all included images are key		

- elements of Nisqually culture and have been since time immemorial.
- Slide 5: Nisqually Tribal History. Read excerpts of Nisqually tribal history included on slide. Invite discussion and add information about Fishing Wars, etc as desired.
- Slide 6: Nisqually Tribe Today: Read examples of Nisqually tribal activities today and play linked video about economic activity

## **Optional:**

- Slide 7: Key Terms: define the terms on slide 7 to ensure students understand key ideas presented through this lesson and land acknowledgment.
- Slide 8: Discussion Prompts: Before and after lesson, invite discussion using stems on slide 8 to help students engage with main ideas and implications of this lesson & land acknowledgment
- Slide 9: Additional Information & Resources: Materials linked here can be used for activities such as a document study on the Medicine Creek Treaty, research projects about Native land in Washington State, or discussions about current issues facing Native communities.
